



## **Internship at the Internationale Winteruniversität Kassel**

*Better prepared for life in Germany*

While studying Germanistics at the University of Oklahoma since August 2016 **Scott Galliard** suddenly decided to pursue a master's degree in Germany only a few months before it would begin. Despite the short notice and problems with his application, an internship was quickly found by the SSG-Interns Program at Kassel's university.

I was an assistant for the **Internationale Winteruniversität** (IWU), which was a short program meant to attract international students to Kassel. My tasks were highly varied; some days I filed papers and made copies, and other days I accompanied the students to events or hiked through a national park to make photographs. Some of my more interesting tasks were shopping for napkins and bananas, making coffee, and describing how to navigate the university. Sometimes I spent only an hour or two at the university, and sometimes most of a day.

English-speaker, I was frequently utilized. I even translated the Oberbürgermeister's speech for the IWU's closing ceremony (which he recited verbatim).

I was assigned a host family, and they were indispensable in helping me acclimate to my unfamiliar surroundings. They helped me open a bank account, buy bus tickets, navigate the city, and answer my many questions about the things I needed to do in preparation for my master's studies. My coworkers at the IWU were also very helpful in a similar fashion.
